Fortescue's annual working bee brings the community together

31 August 2016: Fortescue Metals Group's (Fortescue) fifth annual working bee in Roebourne on the weekend brought together close to 150 volunteers to makeover the Roebourne District High School, which teaches students from kindergarten to Grade 12.

Rolling up their sleeves for a great cause were Fortescue employees and their families, teachers, parents and children of the school, and local community members from Roebourne and Karratha, including prisoners on supervised release from Roebourne Regional Prison.

Current player, Kiel Brown, and former player, Nick Budgeon, from the Australian men's hockey team, the Kookaburras, also pitched in, swapping their hockey sticks for shovels, paint brushes and landscaping equipment. They were joined by Hockey Australia's Sponsorship Manager, Shane Tonkin, who returned to Roebourne to provide a helping hand.
